

KAWARTHA BRANCH – Charter – 23 June 1979

1979 Autumn

The first meeting of the Kawartha U.E.L. Branch was held in the Bata Library, Trent University, Peterborough, October 14, with an attendance of forty-four persons from Peterborough, Lakefield and Lindsay areas, also, Mr. R.W. Camm, Secretary of the Bay of Quinte Branch, Reverend E. McCrea of the Grand River Branch, and Mr. K.J. Chard of the Dominion Headquarters and Editor of the Loyalist Gazette. Mr. Guy Thompson, President, pro-tem, opened the meeting with the singing of "God Save the Queen" and made introductory remarks.

Beginning in the early fall of 1978 Mr. E.J. Chard searched out persons with Loyalists ancestry in the general area between Toronto and the Bay of Quinte and fostered interest in membership and in the possibility of forming a U.E.L. Branch. During the following months a great deal of work was undertaken in contacting interested persons and in helping them with their applications. Mr. C.C. Strahm of Toronto had a major role in this research. After extensive effort throughout the winter there were sufficient qualified members and many others working on their applications to provide the nucleus for a possible branch. Mr. J.G. Brownscombe and Miss Elizabeth Richardson provided good support in this preliminary work.

On June 23rd, Mr. K.J. Chard arranged for approval by the Dominion Council of the U.E.L. Association to grant a charter for a Kawartha Branch. This was the official beginning of this branch. Charter members are: Mr. J.G. Brownscombe, Mr. K.J. Chard, Miss Elizabeth Richardson, Mr. S.N. Hagerman, Mrs. Jean H.I. Steinburgh, Mrs. W.A. Davidson, Mr. Guy Thompson, Mr. J.D. Sharpe, Mrs. C.H. McBride, Mrs. M. Haggas, Mrs. W.A. Scott, Miss Grace M. Caddy and Mrs. Gordon Roper.

The pro-tem officers for the new branch are: Mr. Guy Thompson, President; Mr. Jack Brownscombe, Treasurer; Mr. Stuart Hagerman, Genealogist; and Miss Elizabeth Richardson, Secretary. Mr. Brownscombe stated that the present membership fee is \$8.00. Mr. Stuart Hagerman spoke about genealogy and said that he would be pleased to assist anyone in the field. He thanked Mrs. Jean Lake, Chairperson, for the Peterborough Genealogical Society, for being present. Miss Elizabeth Richardson outlined her expectations for the Branch and suggestions for communications over the rather large area. She asked for names and addresses for a mailing list.

Mr. Thompson introduced Mr. Chard and thanked him for the extensive display of Loyalist reference materials he had brought from Toronto. Mr. Chard said how very pleased he was to be present at the meeting in such attractive surroundings in the conference room of the University Library overlooking the Trent River. He then mentioned the importance of each member as well as the branch having U.E.L. purposes. Young and old should all feel proud to know about their heritage and to belong to the United Empire Loyalists. This group is different to a Genealogical Society or a Monarchist League and other groups and has its own unique identity. On May 27, 1914 the first Dominion Association was started by a grant of parliament and today there are twenty-two branches across Canada. One gets out of any association what one puts into it and the main thing to remember is that 'All members unite to preserve their traditions and heritage'. Mr. Chard made reference to the flags, U.E.L. banner bearing the Loyalists' coat-of-arms, jewelry, plaques and many other items of interest which are available to members through the branch treasurer from the Dominion Headquarters.

Mr. Thompson asked Mr. Chard to present the first United Empire Loyalist certificate to the new member of the Kawartha U.E.L. Branch: Mrs. Jean Roper. A short question period followed and Mr. Chard answered questions from the floor.

Mr. Hagerman presented a beautiful gavel which he made for the new Kawartha F.E.L. Branch. Appreciation was expressed to him. Mr. Thompson then introduced the guest speaker, Mr. R.K. Armstrong. Mr. Armstrong, an historian and head of the history department in a Peterborough secondary school spoke on Sir John Johnson, whose primary role was arranging to move many Loyalists into Lower and Upper Canada at the end of the 1700's.

His talk was most informative and he made reference to the King's Royal Regiment of New York, The Jessup Rangers and the Palatines. Very interesting was Mr. Armstrong's personal explanation re the settlements around the Cornwall area and the method of the land distribution by Governor Haldimand. Mr. Armstrong stated that the early Loyalist settlers laid the foundations for our nation. They wanted to stay here no matter what hardships they faced.

Young and old should study their history of Canada and the Loyalist history which should be kept alive. He said how pleased he was to speak about the Loyalists at this first meeting of the Kawartha Branch. Mr. Chiles thanked Mr. Armstrong for his informative talk which had brought back memories of his own family history around the Cataraqui area.

The next meeting will be on December 2nd, at the Bata Library featuring presentations in early Loyalists of the area - Adam Scott, Peter Robinson and others.

Bountiful and delicious refreshments were provided by Mrs. J.G. Brownscombe and Miss Elizabeth Richardson and served by these ladies assisted by Mrs. Jean Steinburgh and Mrs. Cliff Turner. An enthusiastic social time followed with many persons using the large display of books, documents and other resources

CHARTER PRESENTED TO KAWARTHA BRANCH

The charter banquet of the Kawartha Branch was held at Rock Haven Motor Hotel on October 4 in Peterborough. A friendly social hour preceded the banquet. The head table guests were ushered in by Gavin Watt, Jr., in Royal Yorkers uniform playing his fife in a typical 18th century manner. .

Chairman, Guy Thompson asked Maj. J. D. L. Howson, F.E., to say the blessing which was then followed by the singing of 'God Save the Queen' and a toast to Her Majesty. Near the end of the dinner Mr. Thompson introduced the head table. Mr. William Dom, MP for Peterborough, presented a gift of a Canadian flag for use at Branch meetings. The chairman read many letters of welcome and congratulations to the new Branch, also greetings from London, Grand River, Hamilton and Bay of Quinte Branches.

Mr. Thompson, charter president of the Kawartha Branch in his welcome address, stressed our responsibility to preserve the gifts we have received from the past. Through the Loyalist Branches across the country this dream is being fulfilled. He concluded with the Churchillian quotation "Let tradition be a rudder. but not an anchor on the voyage of life". The unity of Canada's future has been and will be multicultural success, and this is thanks to our glorious and historical past.

Wellington Borland then introduced an excellent entertaining musical rendition of highlights from the operetta "Oklahoma", by performers from the Peterborough society. Visitors from the Governor Simcoe, London and Bay of Quinte Branches were then introduced.

Prior to presentation of the Kawartha Branch Charter there were comments by the Dominion President for the Loyalist Association. Mr. Eaman said on this occasion of the Branch Charter event, how pleased he was to be able to attend, and what an excellent musical rendition we had just heard. He felt that the musical selections sung gave an interesting beginning for a new Branch in its undertakings and activities as portrayed in the song 'Oh What a Beautiful Morning.' He said the Loyalist Branches will grow and unite through their loyalty to Canada. A united Canada will help to preserve the history of the Loyalists. Mr. Eaman expressed a very warm appreciation to Mr. E. J. Chard for his enthusiastic efforts made to create Association branches across the country. Mr. Chard and Mr. Eaman presented the Charter to the Kawartha Branch president, Mr. Guy Thompson. Mr. Thompson expressed gratitude to the Executive who had worked to make this day a reality for the Kawartha Branch of the United Empire Loyalists. A special thank-you was given to Mr. Chard for his encouragement and many hours of work he had put in for the Branch to get organized. Mr. E. J. Chard thanked Mr. Thompson for his kind words. He then thanked Elizabeth Richardson and Jack Brownscombe for their early work in helping to promote the Branch. Mr. Chard asked for the continued support of all to the Kawartha Branch, and encouraged members to bring new friends to future meetings.

The guest speaker, Mr. Gavin K. Watt, was introduced by Jack Brownscombe. Mr. Watt, in period uniform of the Royal Yorkers, spoke on "The Role of the Loyalist Regiments in the Canadian Department." He mentioned that his interest and hobby in the Loyalists lay in the field of military history of the eighteenth century and that it was a project in 1975 he had undertaken to study. He has pioneered in the field, searching documents in the United States and Canada through newspapers, old letters, etc., which helped to give him a true picture of the Royal Yorkers Regiment during the Revolutionary Period in the United States.

Mr. Watt felt Canadians do not seem to be greatly concerned about their historical past. The Americans on the other hand are very proud of their history - be it through stories of Daniel Boone who was pushed south from Detroit by Butlers' Rangers regiment, or other events they can enact. His interest in the Royal Yorkers Regiment was carefully researched as training had to be realistic as possible. He has organized numerous encampments in replica uniforms, following drills and mock battles in New York State and Ontario. Today over sixty men are active in the militia along with their sons.

Mr. Watt felt that the Loyalist history had been abused. Many books and history texts stress the work and achievement of the Loyalist, but no mention is given to the person who took up the musket and believed in his reason by so doing it was for defence, protection, or for some other reason. He said that perhaps the Kawartha Branch could think of making a list of members' ancestors who had fought in the Royal Yorkers, or to make a study of a regiment which could be more pertinent to the Branch's interest as this would help to bring up-to-date another fact of lost Canadian history.

Joan Lucas thanked Mr. Watt for his most inspirational talk, and presented him with a book on Canadian History written by Pierre Berton, *The Invasion of Canada*.

The banquet closed with the singing of 'O Canada.'

1981 Report

The winter meeting of the Kawartha Branch was held on December 7th, in the Conference Room of the Bata Library, Trent University, Peterborough, Ontario. The President, Guy Thompson, presided.

Reports were made by Betty Richardson, Secretary, Stuart Hagerman, Genealogist and Jack Brownscombe, Treasurer. Mr. John Turner, M.P.P. for Peterborough and Mrs. Turner attended the meeting and Mr. Turner presented the Ontario flag to the Branch. His short address stressed the importance of Loyalties and the

value of our heritages. Mr. Turner had earlier donated the Canadian flag to our Branch at its charter meeting.

Mr. John P. Creighton was welcomed to the Branch and presented with his certificate by Guy Thompson. Mrs. Joan Lucas, daughter of Mr. Creighton, assisted in the impressive presentation. Our Branch member Keith Chiles delivered an entertaining and humorous speech entitled, "Doodles". Keith is a member of the International Toastmaster Club and was runner-up to the winner at Trenton.

Mr. Ken Armstrong then introduced the film, Upper Canada Village and gave a short background to the events surrounding the settlement of the area and the changes that occurred prior to the erection of Upper Canada Village. Most of the 35 members and friends who attended the meeting stayed for the special Christmas refreshments prepared and served by Mrs. Ruth Turner and Mrs. Brownscombe.

The February meeting was held as usual in the Bata Library, Trent University, Peterborough. Mr. Guy Thompson welcomed members and guests and introduced Mr. Stuart Hagerman, our Branch genealogist, with the suggestion that guests might like to speak to Mr. Hagerman regarding membership. Mr. Thompson gave a brief report of the executive meeting and of his talk in February on Loyalists and the Loyalists' Association to the Kiwanis Scotts Plains Branch.

A membership and treasurer's report was given by Jack Brownscombe. Mr. S. Hagerman gave a report on new members' applications and books available for Loyalist research. Mrs. R. Wessell (ancestor Peter Irish) was presented with her certificate by Mr. Thompson and Mr. Hagerman. Our president then gave a short report on the recent heritage meeting in Toronto on February 14 concerning historical conservation and promotion, with Mr. E. J. Chard representing our Branch. Mr. Thompson also reported on the coming U.E.L. Convention hosted by the Sir Guy Carlton Branch in Ottawa, May 28 June 1. More information will be available at our next meeting.

The loss to all Canadians on the death of Mr. John Fisher, F.E., was expressed by our president. Members and friends were asked to reserve Saturday, October 3, which is the date of our annual dinner when our guest will be the Honourable John Black Aird, Lieutenant Governor of Ontario. Mr. W. Borland gave a report on plans for the annual dinner which will be held at the Peterborough Golf and Country Club.

Our Branch is investigating the possibility of a bus tour of the Mohawk Valley on June 5, 6 and 7 and Mr. Borland outlined the trip with the request that interested persons notify members of the executive by our next meeting in April so plans can be formalized.

Mrs. Florence Maynes then gave a brief outline of some of the plans for the Kawartha Conference Heritage Festival June 19 - 20, where our Branch will have a display. Mrs. Jean Lake is our representative for this conference.

The new executive for 1981 was installed as follows: President, Mr. Guy Thompson; Vice-President, Mrs. Joan Lucas; Secretary, Mrs. Mary Scott; Treasurer, Mr. W. Borland; Genealogist, Mr. S.N. Hagerman; Publicity, Mr. J. Brownscombe and Mr. K. Borland; Historical Committee, Mr. K. Armstrong and Miss Betty Richardson; Refreshments, Mrs. Ruth Turner and Mrs. Norma Brownscombe and Bicentennial, Mr. K. Chiles and Mrs. Jean Lake.

Mr. Keith Chiles outlined possible Bicentennial projects. This was followed by a discussion and proposals from the floor. Mr. Guy Thompson then presented some slides of a tour of the Mohawk Valley prefaced by a short talk on the Importance to Ontario of the Loyalists from the area of the Mohawk Valley.

Our next meeting will be on April 26 with Mrs. Mary Beacock Fryer, Canadian historian, genealogist and author as the guest speaker. The meeting concluded with a social and refreshments served by Mrs. J. Brownscombe and Mrs. Ruth Turner.

The General meeting of the Kawartha U.E.L. Branch was held at the Bata Library, Trent University, April 26th at 2:00 p.m. with twenty-seven members present.

Mr. Guy Thompson, President, opened the meeting with a welcome to the members and guests, and thanked the members of the Executive who prepared and mailed the Newsletter for the branch.

Presentation of her Membership Certificate was made by the President along with Mr. Borland to Rosalie Terry.

There will be a meeting on May 20th for the Executive and any others interested to meet with Mr. Carl Thorpe, Supervisor, Historical Research Section, Heritage Administration Board, Ministry of Culture and Recreation Board, to advise our Branch of the Ontario Government support in promoting events of historical interest. The Executive has agreed as a bicentennial project to establish a scholarship fund to provide prizes in some secondary schools each year to begin 1984. The Branch would solicit assistance through government grants, service clubs, or private donations. The interest should provide appropriate prizes to worthy students each year. Keith Chiles as Chairman of the BiCentennial Committee reported that Jack Brownscombe had been interviewed on T.V. by a local media person, on the purposes and background of the Kawartha Branch.

Mr. Stu Hagerman reported as Genealogist that there were two new applications with one application in process.

Mrs. Jean Lake then introduced the guest speaker, Mary Beacock Fryer, from Brockville. She attained a B.A. at University of Toronto with M. A. at Edinburgh University. She is a U.E.L. member, having worked as a town planner, and lectured in the Geography Department at University of Toronto. Her U.E.L. family is Caleb and Martha Seaman. She has written books such as *Loyalist Spy*, *Escape 1975*, *Thousand Islands 1976*, and has now just published *"King's Men" 1980*, principally with interest in five regiments 1775-1784. Other books are *"Rideau Waterway"*, *"Buckskin Pimpernel"* and *"New Beginnings"*.

Mary Beacock Fryer explained that in her way of thinking, the U.E.L.'s are not myths, but heroes. She gave many interesting anecdotes about loyalist figures and regiments. Her great wish would be to have the Haldimand Papers published as were Sir John Johnson's. One particular but rather unknown reference was to the fact that it was Butler's Rangers along with the Indians met and defeated the Americans at the Ohio Valley where Israel Boone, son of Daniel Boone, was killed. Mary Beacock Fryer felt that the importance in history of the U.E.L. landing was "killed" by the Victorian Influence. Mr. Ken Armstrong thanked Mary Beacock Fryer on behalf of the Branch for her enjoyable speech.

MOHAWK VALLEY TRIP KAWARTHA BRANCH

Friday June 5th. 5 p.m. was the departure time of the bus carrying members and friends of the Kawartha Branch to the Mohawk Valley to visit the historical sites of interest where the ancestors of Loyalists fled from that part of the American colonies during the American Revolution.

Stops were made at Port Hope and Belleville to pick up members of the tour from other branches of the Association enroute to our destination at the Holiday Inn in Johnstown. A pleasant social trip with many laughs due to Russ Curry's countless jokes and ad libs was capped off by coffee after midnight prepared by the courteous staff to make our two nights stay a memorable experience at the Holiday Inn.

The next morning began with the visit to Johnson Hall which was the home of Sir William Johnson built in 1763 and has been painstakingly restored. There was a well conducted guided tour with responsible and honest comments pertaining to the role and plight of the area residents who in 1776 chose not to support the rebellion and as a result became known as Loyalists. Many of these Loyalists fled to Canada led by Sir John Johnson, the son of Sir William Johnson.

In appreciation of the tour and in response to the interest shown by the curator the Branch donated a copy of Mary Beacock Fryer's book the King's Men to the Johnson Hall's library. We trust the 'King's Men' will add to the historical perspective of the visitors to the Hall.

The next stop was downtown Johnstown (founded by and named after Sir Wm. Johnson) which has several points of historical interest. A short visit to the Fulton County jail and Court House was followed by a longer visit to the Johnstown Public Library which has a Genealogical Room with numerous reference books, newspaper clippings, family histories and documents pertaining to the early families many of whom are our kith and kin.

After a short lunch which was conveniently timed with a violent thunder storm, a lengthy visit was made to the local museum where the staff extended the most cordial and enthusiastic support and assistance answering many questions put forward by members of our tour group.

Our next stop was at Butlersbury. the home of John Butler. commander of Butler's Rangers. This delightful old home is several miles from Johnstown and sits on high ground overlooking the Mohawk Valley. The present owners had tried to have the house declared a National Historical Site but were turned down.

The turbulent story of the Butlers, hated today because of the revolutionary raids on Cherry Valley, the support of the British at Oriskany and their knowledge of the Iroquois who helped in many raids up and down the valley, long ago destined the house to ignominy. We Canadians cannot be too critical as we tore down a later Butlersburg at Niagara to make room for a highway.

After refreshments at Butlersburg served by the owner. Mrs. Lang and her daughters, we headed to Sir William Johnson's earlier home known as Fort Johnson which is now a museum and historical site. A pleasant hour was spent touring the restored building which houses many interesting antiques of that period and in particular the attic where several old pieces of equipment are stored.

Our next stop at Guy Park Manor was a disappointment as the Manor was closed for the day however, we toured the grounds and enjoyed the view of the Mohawk River and locks located in front of the Manor. The bus returned us to the Inn for an excellent dinner and an evening of reading, socializing or touring the city of Johnstown.

The next day. Sunday, was touring and return home but the first stop was for church at St. Johns Episcopal Church in Johnstown. Our group paraded in for the service led by Keith Chiles and Stu Haggerman bearing our flags.

The original church was built by Sir William Johnson for "Churching the people of his settlement about 1760". It should be noted that in 1762 Sir William also gave fifty acres to be divided equally between the Lutheran and Reformed Churches 'an example of tolerance somewhat uncommon for that period.

On October 25, 1781, a battle took place at the "Stone Church" which was six days after the surrender of Lord Cornwallis at Yorktown. Fire destroyed the original church in 1836 and the present church was built in 1837. In erecting his church Sir William built a crypt under the chancel for his place of burial. He was buried there in July 1774 at the age of 59. Rumour has it that the present church was located slightly to the east so that Sir William's grave would be outside the church because of his royalist feelings.

After the church service, the members of the church hosted a light lunch and a social hour sharing many interesting stories with us. One especially interesting note is that the names of those who died at the battle of Johnstown are being collected and the parishioners are anxious to include the names of Loyalists who died in the last battle of the war. At present they have only one name.

Leaving Johnstown we headed up the beautiful Mohawk Valley which followed the river passing numerous historical sites. Time did not allow us to stop for visiting until we reached Herkimer House near Little Falls.

Two unplanned stops were made, the first was a tunnel we wanted to go through, but it was too low. The driver would not follow the advice of one of our group who suggested that we back up and take a run at it. The other stop was when we were crossing the Mohawk River. The old bridge had a sign stating the load capacity, which was lower than our loaded bus. In this case the driver did take our advice when it was pointed out that "we had attended church in the morning".

The tour of Herkimer House was very interesting, particularly since that day was craft day and numerous exhibits and demonstrations were being presented, including sheep shearing, spinning, the dyeing of the yarns and weaving. Of particular interest, was the weaving being done on a machine with a label "made in Elmira, Ontario, Canada".

The last stop of the trip was the Oriskany Battlefield where on August 6, 1777, one of the bloodiest battles of the war was fought with more than a third of the contestants on each side being killed or wounded. This site is an excellent example of how history can be utilized and distorted to satisfy the aim of any group or country. The monument was erected in 1883, to honour a Rebel victory which was actually won by the Loyalists when they defeated Gen. Herkimer who was marching to relieve the besieged garrison at Fort Stanwix. There is even some doubt as to why "the American hero General Nicholas Herkimer the intrepid leader" of the Rebel forces was on the rebel side. No mention was made of his wife or brother who fled to Canada as Loyalists. His home was passed to another brother George, after General Herkimer's death due to the unskilled amputation of his leg after the battle.

It is encouraging that current historians on both sides of the contest are attempting to document more honestly the true circumstances and events of those tragic times.

With the roll called and the bus loaded we headed for Canada and home. It is with regret that we passed up so many spots of Loyalist interest. But it allows us to look forward to another visit later. Since a trip to Butlersburg or as it is now known, Niagara-on-the-Lake, is planned for next year, the return trip to the beautiful Mohawk Valley, the starting point for most of Ontario's Loyalists, is some time in the future.

ANNUAL BANQUET

The Peterborough Golf and Country Club was the location Saturday, October 3, for the second annual dinner of the United Empire Loyalists, Kawartha Branch.

As well as members from Peterborough County, others came from an area stretching from Lake Ontario to Lake Nipissing, Kingston to Orillia.

As the special guest of honour, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, John Black Aird, was present to give greetings on behalf of Queen Elizabeth.

Chairman for the special event, Ken Armstrong, who was representing Guy Thompson, president, who is in Nottingham, England, said "68,000 UEL's had a great impact on this part of British North America 198 years ago and their descendants still cherish the finest of ideals and principles upon which this province was founded. Nothing is more vital to the survival of Canada as an identifiable nation of the Western Hemisphere than its remaining loyal to its own traditions. What we need in Canada today is the same sort of loyalty that inspired the UEL to leave their homes for the wilds of a new frontier. The suffering and sacrifices endured by the UEL are not demanded of us today, only the same state of mind. "

The Lieutenant-Governor, in his short address, said that this was his first time in Peterborough. He said the UEL's are a guardian of our heritage, a trust passed on through the generations.

Guest speaker of the evening was Sheriff Stan McBride who was dressed in full regalia and made an impressive entrance carrying a sword followed by the rest of the Vice-Regal party led by Piper Tom Chalmers. Stan was introduced by Wellington Borland, who described Stan's active past and his devoted loyalty and contributions to Peterborough.

He said "the UEL's might not be royalty but they have a lot of nobility." He is presently attempting to qualify to become a U.E.L. To be a member "One must prove his ancestor took the side of the king during the American Revolution and fought for the crown or suffered hardships by being persecuted by the loss of land, and homes, pulling up roots, etc., for the crown. The original UEL's settled from the Maritimes to Niagara and earned what their country owed them. They brought with them a God fearing belief, courtesy and respect, not only for people but for their rights and belongings. It costs us nothing to be linked to the country that provided us with our roots and no one in our lifetime has had to suffer through the connection with the crown.

"It is of the utmost importance that we today believe in the good of today's youth. It's the exception that makes the news. We must support our young people. They are all that we have."

Mr. McBride brought a fine spirit of humour and stirred the U.E.L. spirit.

In appreciation Elizabeth Richardson presented Mr. McBride with a book, The King's Men, by Mary Beacock Fryer, the story of the Loyalist regiments who became the soldier founders of the province of Ontario, the Loyal Colonials who joined the Provincial Corps of the British Army, Canadian Command, during the American Revolution.

As an added treat, entertainment was provided by The St. James Church Players - Lois Hurley, Shirley Lannen, Tom Chard and Fred Huffman with piano played by Ruth King.

It was a great banquet and a great spirit among all who attended. Appreciation is due to those who so carefully prepared and directed the gala event Ken Armstrong, Wellington Borland, Keith Borland, Jack Brownscombe, and Mrs. Mary Scott.

The 1982 Annual bus trip of the Kawartha Branch, took members and friends of the branch and Belleville and Toronto branches to Niagara Peninsula, and in particular to Niagara-on-the-Lake - a United Empire Loyalist stronghold.

On Friday, June 4th, we arrived at the historic Prince of Wales Hotel in Niagara-on-the-Lake built in 1864 and more recently completely renovated to include all modern amenities.

The cold, windy, wet weather this weekend did not dampen our spirits too much, but did dampen our pedestrian excursions. Our first stop on Saturday, was at the Niagara Historical Museum. Here we viewed historical displays relating to Isaac Brock, Laura Secord, U.E. Loyalists, the military, the monarchy and the pioneers. Also, there were special collections relating to specific area families such as the Kirby family, the Secord family, the Servos family and the Ball family.

We enjoyed lunch at the Oban Inn in Niagara-on-the-Lake. Situated "by the Golf Course and overlooking the Lake, the Oban Inn began as the home of a ship's captain in the 1820's." The next stop was Fort George which was built between 1796 and 1799 to replace Fort Niagara as the British Army Headquarters on the Niagara Frontier. We had a wonderful tour of this Fort thanks to our well informed guide. "In 1937 Fort George was restored, and today it provides an authentic and colourful look at a soldier's life in the early 1800's." As we walked through the soldiers' living accommodation those of us not warmly attired could appreciate how difficult life was in winter. The gun holes along the walls must have allowed the snow and penetrating cold to make life miserable in the poorly heated barracks. The uniforms displayed certainly did not appear as warm as those used by the military today. Although outnumbered by the Americans throughout the War of 1812, the British forces eventually managed to retain the Niagara Frontier. Much of the area around Niagara-on-the-Lake was used for quartering and training troops during the two World Wars. The area includes Fort George, Fort Mississauga and Butler's Barracks. During World War I "a field of canvas" sprang up on the Garrison Reserve Land. Today's Shaw Festival Theatre stands where many of the tents were pitched but today there is little or no evidence of its having been used for this purpose. The wind and the rain hampered our progress and enjoyment of the tour somewhat, but, even so, it was the highlight of the trip.

Following our tour of Fort George, we set out for Niagara Falls. On our way we passed the Laura Secord Homestead and at Queenston Heights battleground we could see Brock's Monument. In Niagara Falls we visited Lundy's Lane Historical Museum which is housed in a cut stone building erected in 1874. It is located on the site of the fierce Battle of Lundy's Lane where British and Canadian and American forces fought on July 25, 1814. We enjoyed a brief glimpse of the Falls and travelled the scenic route back to our hotel.

In Niagara-on-the-Lake, still with raindrops falling on our heads, many of our group squeezed in a few minutes of shopping. One shop of particular interest was the Niagara Apothecary dedicated in 1971 as an authentic restoration of a pharmacy that first opened its doors on the premises in 1866 after having served the town at other locations since the early 19th century. Many of the buildings in Niagara-on-the-Lake are being restored in a manner reminiscent of the early 19th century.

Following dinner Saturday evening at The Buttery Theatre Restaurant, the tourists visited the Shaw Festival Theatre where, unfortunately, the controversial play "Camille" by Robert David MacDonald was presented.

Sunday morning we had a bus tour of the historic sites and buildings of Niagara-on-the-Lake conducted by John L. Field. We visited St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church which dates from 1831. After a wind storm in 1855 which severely damaged the roof the architect recommended its reconstruction as a hipped form at the rear. In 1937 restoration took place. "Its graceful columns at the entrance and its striking interior have a charm that certainly endures." We worshipped at St. Mark's Anglican Church and received a hearty welcome. Mr. Field gave us an outline of the history of St. Mark's stating that in 1813 the Americans captured Niagara and it was occupied territory for seven months. St. Mark's Church was turned into a hospital and barracks. Trenches were dug among the tombstones in the churchyard. Soldiers used the flat stones as chopping blocks and evidence of this is still visible today.

After lunch we arrived at Jordan, and visited the Museum. It was primarily an agricultural museum comprising the Fyfe House, the old school and another home. Jordan is situated at 20 Mile Creek (20 miles from Fort George) overlooking a ravine.

Homeward bound, our next stop was Grimsby, Ontario located at 40 Mile Creek (40 miles from Fort George) along the Niagara Escarpment. Mr. Smith, our Guide, related the history of St. Andrew's Church, a parish founded by Loyalists in 1787 under the leadership of Andrew Pettit, who invited friends to worship in his home until a log church was built in 1794. Later, a frame building was erected and the present stone structure was erected in 1819. St. Andrew's Church, Grimsby, is the fourth oldest Church in Ontario. Loyalist graves are in the churchyard of St. Andrew's.

The Grout Homestead, situated across from St. Andrew's Church was built about 1832 when the Rev. George Grout was rector of St. Andrew's. The weather was still inclement, but the present owners of this old home graciously received us and we listened to an interesting dialogue on its history.

We did have a very informative weekend and many thanks are extended to Mr. Wimp Borland and Mrs. Mary Scott for arranging this trip for us.

LINDSAY'S 125th ANNIVERSARY HOMECOMING PARADE

The Kawartha Branch of the United Empire Loyalists was all was proud to participate in the 125th Anniversary Homecoming Parade in Lindsay on July 31. Our float was in the "Our People" section of the parade which was two hours long over a 3 km route. Later the floats remained on display in the exhibition grounds.

Our float mounted on a farm wagon drawn by a team of Belgian horses depicted a scene whereby a United Empire Loyalist family was starting to make a life in the Ontario bush. A woman, her two children and two soldiers representing the King's Royal Regiment and Butler's Rangers and a drummer boy were outside the log cabin. The float carried a Canadian Flag and the U.E.L. Flag as well as a banner announcing the Bicentennial of the United Empire Loyalists in Ontario in 1984. Two blue and gold banners indicating "UNITED EMPIRE LOYALISTS" together with an attached Provincial Crest were suspended from the sides of the wagon.

Betty Richardson, Mary Scott and Isabel Wessell formed the committee to prepare the float. Once they had the plan it had be executed. How to build the log cabin was a big problem! After discarding many possible solutions, Bob Wessell sent word "leave the building of the cabin to me." They did! It began with the cutting down of two 50' basswood trees. It involved working each night and Saturdays for two weeks to complete the project. The night they arranged to have the backdrop painted, it rained, but all was moved to a neighbour's barn. Three young lads from Lindsay came and peeled the bark off the logs to make the roof and door of the cabin.

Then the soldiers had to be clothed in appropriate attire. Reference books were borrowed from the library and U.E.L. Dominion Headquarters and a local school library and an effort was made to have the uniforms as authentic as possible. Only pictures guided them. Material and buttons (60 in all) for the uniforms and the tricorne hats were purchased in Toronto. Our seamstress did a wonderful job creating the patterns and then the uniforms for the soldiers.

Identification banners were needed and arrangements were made with Mr. Chard of the U.E.L. Headquarters to have two banners made. The branch appreciated very much the U.E.L. Headquarters' generosity. The banners were made by Flags Unlimited in Thornton, Ontario and had to be picked up. They were on display for the first time on our float in the Lindsay parade but these banners will be used by other branches over the next two years.

A banner was prepared for the back of the float proclaiming the Bicentennial in 1984, our Branch name and showing an early Loyalist symbol. It was painted on special banner cloth with special paints.

Still another problem – a neighbour who had promised that he would bring his team of horses to pull our float on the day of the parade sold his horses the previous week. However, we did obtain a beautiful team of Belgian horses from another source to pull the float.

The most exciting part of the whole operation was the assembly of the float in Memorial Park, Lindsay. Picture if you will - the arrival of the wagon with the cabin behind a van; the arrival of the team of Belgians in a horse van; the soldiers arriving in uniform with period rifles from the 1700s and the mother with her two children arriving in costume. Then, the final flurry of activity assembling the flags, the trees and stumps, the banners, the outdoor cooking standard with a kettle all of which had to be anchored to the wagon.

We were ready for the parade! What a thrill to see the United Empire Loyalist float appear before our eyes in the Homecoming Parade of Lindsay's 125th Anniversary celebrations.

1985 June

Obituary: **FRANCES EDITH WATT** of 24 Manion Street, Thunder Bay passed away on February 14, 1985 at the age of eighty-nine. A member of Governor Simcoe Branch for many years, she was a direct descendant of Colonel John Butler, U.E. and a staunch defender of her Loyalist background.

She married Herbert James Watt, D.V.S. in 1915. After the war of 1914-17 they settled in Manitoba. After several moves, the family of five children moved from Dryden, Ontario to Port Arthur in 1938. She was very active in community affairs: Member of St. John's Anglican Church, Life Member of Womens' Institute of Canada, Port Arthur Branch, Charter member of the Dawson Court Auxiliary, and a member of West Algoma Council of Women. She was always interested in women's rights.

Predeceased by her husband, she has three surviving daughters, Mrs. Mary Scott, Lindsay, Mrs. Dorothy Cook and Mrs. Phyllis Stinson, Thunder Bay, and a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Lea Watt of Burnaby, B.C. About 1965, Mrs. Watt began to establish her family tree. She had traced her family back to the Duke of Ormonde, Kilkenny, Ireland and a Baronetcy of the Schermerhorn family in Holland and later descendants from John Butler.

She praised the co-operation of the New York Archives but regretted that many artifacts and records were flowing to the United States, e.g. the Regimental Staff of Colonel John Butler that was given to an American Church at Johnstown, N.Y.

After establishing membership in the United Empire Loyalists, she wrote, by hand, five books of her Loyalist family, one for each of her children.

The daughters and friends of Frances E. Watt will long remember her personal strength and pride in being of Loyalist stock.

This obituary was adapted from the obituary notice in the Peterborough Examiner, 29 Jan. 1997, and from notes provided by Joan Lucas, Genealogist of the Kawartha Branch.

M McBride, Mrs. Helen Robina (King), UE, at Civic Hospital on Monday, 27 Jan. 1997, in her 87th year. She was the wife of Collins 'Mac' Hillier McBride, former manager of Graftons clothing store of Peterborough, and mother of Robert Collins McBride and his wife, Grietje Renskea (Purdy) McBride of Maple Grove Farms, RR#1, Indian River.

Mrs. McBride was a proven descendant of fourteen United Empire Loyalists. Among them were McGregory Van Every, Adam (Jung) Young and Capt. John B. DeCou.

McGregory Van Every and Adam Young were two of the first sixteen families to farm the Niagara Peninsula. Adam Young and his family became the first white settlers of Haldimand County.

John B. DeCou was a founder of the Welland Canal and established mills at DeCew Falls in Lincoln County and later at Decewsville, Haldimand County. It was to his home at DeCew Falls that Laura Secord walked to warn Lt. Fitzgibbon of the advancing American forces during the War of 1812.

Mrs. McBride had a life-long interest and love for United Empire Loyalists and our Association. This she passed on to her son and his family who are in the process of proving their descent from all fourteen U.E.L. ancestors. What a legacy she has left for her family!

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Dr. Jonathan David Arthur Good UE receives the Diamond Jubilee Medal

When I began teaching in Bowmanville, Ontario, in September 1969, the Public Health Nurse, Sandra Good, spent many days with me as I described the Grade 7 students in my classroom to her. Many years later, when I was in charge of the Gifted Programme for the Northumberland/Newcastle Board of Education, a young man assigned to me in the early 1980s was Sandra's son, Jonathan Good, a Grade 7 student at Dr. Hawkins Senior Public School in Port Hope, Ontario. Jonathan and I spent many enjoyable hours together as he pursued his activities in the Gifted programme in his two years at Dr. Hawkins. His father, Ron Good UE, became a member of Kawartha Branch on 20 February 1985 and the Legal Advisor for the United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada (UELAC) in 2005, while Jonathan became a member of Kawartha Branch on 19 July 1993.

Dr. Jonathan Good UE received a Diamond Jubilee Medal this year for his work in Heraldry.

He became interested in Heraldry through his hobby of stamp collecting. Both subjects involve discrete and beautiful designs that signify historical events.

When he was a high school student at Trinity College School in Port Hope, Ontario, Jonathan completed a self-study of heraldry and examined the school's coat of arms. He enjoyed the symbols and aesthetics of a well-designed coat of arms and the fact that this part of the Canadian honours system is a grant of honour from the Queen.

As a monarchist, Jonathan appreciates the fact that we have a head of state to carry out the ceremonial functions of government.

He is descended from three Loyalist ancestors, including Eberhardt Wager UE who served in the King's Royal Regiment of New York. Jonathan joined the Royal Heraldry Society of Canada in 1990 and has contributed heraldic articles to *Heraldry in Canada*, was the Assistant Editor of *Hogtown Heraldry*, the

newsletter of the Toronto Branch of the RHSC, and was the Editor of *Gonfanon*, the newsletter of the Royal Heraldry Society of Canada.

In 2006 he received a grant of arms from the Canadian Heraldic Authority and was named a Fellow of the Royal Heraldry Society of Canada in 2007.

Now an Associate Professor and Co-ordinator of the History Program at Reinhardt University in Waleska, Georgia, Jonathan received a PhD in Medieval History in 2004 from the University of Minnesota. A book based on his thesis was published by Boydell and Brewer in 2009. He teaches Reinhardt's Western Civilization survey courses, History 111 and 112, and upper-level courses on Ancient, Medieval, Renaissance and Reformation, and East Asian history. He also serves as faculty advisor to Phi Alpha Theta, the history honour society, and is a co-founder of the Georgia Medievalists' Group. In 2009 he won Reinhardt's faculty research award.

As you can see, this Diamond Jubilee Medal, awarded to Dr. Jonathan David Arthur Good UE, is richly deserved.

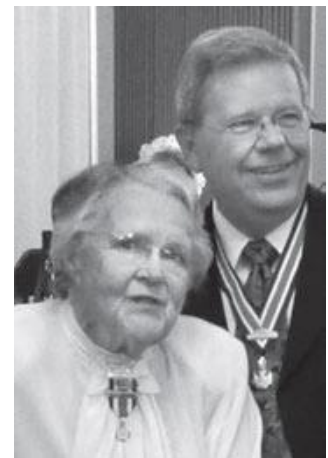
A true and loyal friend

Elizabeth Anne Richardson UE became the Dominion Archivist and Historian of the UELAC in 1986. She drove her father, John Gordon Richardson UE, to the Dominion Council Meetings in Toronto when the family lived in Sarnia, Ontario. In 1967, John arranged for plaques to be placed in both the Ontario and Manitoba Legislative Buildings to commemorate UE Loyalists. Betty undoubtedly attended more Dominion Council meetings than anyone else and was instrumental in the formation of the Kawartha Branch UELAC in 1979, serving as Branch President in 1984-1988 and 1992-1994.

At the Association level, Elizabeth established a Book of Remembrance and the Memorial Fund and chaired the UELAC Conference Committee for over ten years. She purchased, with her own funds, Loyalist research documents and books that she felt would benefit the UELAC collection.

Elizabeth was an unforgettable and valued friend. As Branch President she always brought national issues to Kawartha Branch meetings. She was a strong advocate of unity among members from sea to sea. Several visits to her home revealed her intense interest in protecting our Loyalist legacy and promoting UE history.



At the UELAC 2003 Conference in Waterloo, the theme was Oktoberfest. There was a lot of celebrating and revelry directed toward the UELAC Honoured Benefactor, Squadron Leader Phillip E. M. Leith UE. In the centre of it was Elizabeth Richardson taking it in and stoking the flames of laughter. Betty said Oktoberfest reminded her of teaching in Germany where she made so many good friends.

Elizabeth cherished her many friendships throughout the world and we count ourselves among her many supporters. Elizabeth Anne Richardson UE will sincerely be missed by us all.

It is one of Canada’s oldest regiments, a reserve army unit that is part of the 33 Canadian Brigade Group. Based in Belleville Armouries, the so-called Hasty P’s have garrisons there as well as in Peterborough and Cobourg, Ontario.

On 18 November 2012, Dr. Michael Eamon, Trent University History Professor, gave us an enjoyable history lesson. He told of the display in the Canadian War Museum in Ottawa and the efforts in acquiring

the memorabilia to be used, an appropriate production to remind us of the War of 1812. Undoubtedly a great deal of planning and work went into it.
