## Trip to Edmonton Branch, Edmonton, Alberta: Saturday, December 1, 2012



On a day that saw de-icers washing the wings of our airplane, we set out for Edmonton, Alberta. In contrast to the minus 14 degree temperatures on arrival, we were warmly greeted at the airport by Gillian and Dave Rolls UE, Edmonton Branch Genealogist, and driven to the hotel located almost adjacent to the beautiful First Presbyterian Church where we would meet Edmonton Branch members the next day. Trevor Angell UE met us for dinner. We shared stories about his family history and ours and ways to increase membership in the branch. Both Trevor and Heather Traub, Acting

President for the Branch, told me about the importance of receiving news from the areas in Eastern Canada where their Loyalists first settled. Stories and articles about Loyalist subjects draw them closer to their own roots whether it comes by electronic means or in the form of *The Loyalist Gazette*.

The next morning we John met Maher UE who took us on a tour of the Royal Alberta Museum and the impressive First Presbyterian Church.

The museum houses a breathtaking collection of



environmental and natural exhibits as well as cultural displays such as an on-loan large display of hand-made Inuit dolls and a large aboriginal gallery including a diorama of Anthony Henday's arrival in Alberta in 1754. John reminded us that Edmonton is not as far north as people think, as it is located in the lower half of the province. This city is a "young" city with few buildings as old as the one-hundred-year-old church. Over lunch John spoke about his Loyalist ancestor, Hugh Munro(e) UE, and about the thrill of the quest to locate parts of the family history, especially when he discovers something long forgotten about an ancestor and his life. We can all relate to this feeling.





After I brought greetings from the office of the Dominion President, my wife and I presented our skit about my Loyalist ancestor, Adam Young UE, and his wife, Catherine Elizabeth Schremling, telling a very familiar tale of persecution and loss suffered by all of our Loyalist ancestors. We were thanked by Edmonton Branch Social Convenor, Fran Losie UE, with the presentation of Wild Alberta at the Crossroads by Marion and Robin White, an award-



winning book endorsing responsible development of resources in Alberta. In addition we received a kitchen wall hanging depicting the humorous rights and privileges of a Scottish cook!


After an appropriate break in the evening, a gift basket was professionally auctioned off by Trevor Angell to the great delight of all attending.
