Plaque Ceremony - Loyalist Burial Site

The Loyalists were the first non-Indigenous people to settle our region in 1784, following the American Revolutionary War. Here they built the foundation of modern Ontario. The United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada (St. Lawrence Branch) erects plaques to commemorate our local Loyalist burial sites. The next plaque unveiling will take place on the following day and location:

LOYALIST BURIAL GROUND PROJECT



Beneath the ground, in numerous cemeteries located in Stormont, Dundas & Glengarry (SD&G), lie the mortal remains of Loyalists: The men and women who supported the Crown during the American Revolutionary War (1775-1783). The St. Lawrence Branch launched a project, in 2018, to formally recognize these locations. Its mandate: To identify and confirm the locations, and to erect enduring plaques to recognize the special importance of these sites.
